

What Makes a Good Technical Writer? Excelling in the Workplace












Good Writers Make Most Professions and Accomplishments Possible

There is a direct correlation between your ability to "language," your ability to read and interpret text of all manifestations, your ability to write, your ability to




communicate orally, to present, and your ability to be successful in your chosen profession. The more you know about how your own mind works and how to develop and refine your language skills in the workplace, the more successful you will be. Good writers and communicators in the work environment are "go to" leaders.

# What Makes for a Good Technical Writer?



• Has Insight and Sagacity: A good technical writer understands how his or her mind works, when to invoke analytical thinking, when to invoke imaginative thinking, how to recognize useful thoughts when they occur spontaneously and without invocation.

• Uses Reality-Directed Imaginative Thinking: A strong imagination contributes to working out objective scenarios and leads to sorting which facts, scenarios, and options are important and which are not, which options are possible and which are not.


Is Psychologically Flexible and Adaptable: It's not about ego, it's about getting the job done. Learn to set yours aside and focus on objectives. "The job is the boss." Don't be a victim or scapegoat, maintain respect, but learn not to take things personally. You are not a robot or an empty vessel or one who simply transcribes a process. You are a "trained professional" that has a contribution to make. You're an integral part of the team's success.

Is Socially Flexible and Adaptable: In order to be successful, interpret your work and organizational culture and the people who make it up to nurture a collaborative environment. Good technical writers are good networkers. They know they need others to help them get their jobs done. Be diplomatic.

Is Able to Analyze Audiences: It takes great insight to know how others think, what their needs are, how they will respond to the "whats" and "hows" of your writing. Audiences these days can range from very small, narrowly defined intra-cultural groups to larger audiences with a global reach, different culture, and ethnic background. Demographic evaluations and "user profiles" need to be thorough and comprehensive.

o Is a Strong Writer: It's critical to understand the principles of mechanics, grammar, narrative sequencing, and rhetoric. Rhetoric is the art or craft of using language effectively and

persuasively.


Understands Rhetorical Strategy: Aristotle defined three main rhetorical approaches:

**Ethos –** Relies on reputation of the author, based on character of speaker;

Logos - Based on logic or reason; and

**Pathos** – Based on emotion (advertisement/marketing).

 Must be an Editor/Fixer Supreme: It's very difficult to edit one's own work. Develop a process, learn to build in enough time in a project to set it aside for a prescribed period of time, then go back to it and edit it again. Learn proof and copy editors' marks and symbols.





Knows How to Balance Deadlines and Quality: A good technical writer is almost always slammed with deadlines. He or she must learn to work quickly without compromising the quality of the job.

#### Is Able to Multitask:

Often, technical writers need to manage more than one project at a time. It's important to maintain consistency and progress when it comes to working simultaneously (or concurrently) on more than one document.




Is Able to Anticipate **Problems Before they Arise** and Be Proactive in Solving Them When They Do: This means knowing the work culture, the people in it, the specifications, the hardware, the software, all the variables that go into making a system smooth.

o Is Able to Quickly Interpret and Fully Comprehend Complicated and Nuanced Processes, Materials, Methods, and Specifications: "Know your stuff." One of the

beauties of the job is that one can always strive to become a subject-matter-expert. You, more than anyone else, need to know how to think like other members of the collaborative team.

stability. It also clears the mind and allows new solutions to surface.




 Understands How to Move the Process Forward: An ability to move the process forward and stay focused is a valuable attribute in a workplace that pushes timesensitive projects and has deadlines to meet.



Knows How to Ask the Right Questions: Asking the right question at the right time in the right manner is a highly-skilled art. "Know thyself," the ancient Greeks said. Also, know others.



Understands Graphic Design and Structured Authoring Software/Environments: This is visual rhetoric. Take classes or teach yourself how to use graphics and structured authoring software.






